

Dear Friends.

When we were young we both learnt a nursery rhyme:-

The north wind doth blow
And we shall have snow,
And what will poor robin do then, poor thing?
He'll hide in the barn

There is a wind blowing through our churches, a wind of renewal and recommitment. We are being challenged to think about the church, our life together as a church, and our mission. The musicians were always mentioned in the Old Testament as they held an important part in worship and in leading people into battle, and the same is true for us today. We ask, therefore, that you will pray for the music, the instrumentalists and the vocalists and those who will organise and encourage, that together we may make music fit for our King.

May we thank all of you who shared in the celebration of Christmas with us and for all the cards and greetings we received. As a family we felt really blessed by God's love and fellowship during our first Christmas with you all. As we wished you all a Christ filled Christmas, we pray your New Year will also be Christ filled and you will enjoy His peace and love in the days ahead.

Please do continue to pray for us as we continue to seek God's leading into this New Year.

#### REPORT OF THE SUSSEX WEST DISTRICT COUNCIL MEETING ON 11.11.1993.

The meeting was held at Christ Church, Chichester, and devotions were led by Rev. Stuart Bidmead on an Armistice Day theme. Prayers were said for the bereaved family of Peter Spicer, for Nev. Derek Merrill and Wendy Walker (Provincial Youth and Children's Officer), both seriously ill in hospital, and for the Churches in the Worthing Area.

Paul West from Sompting spoke of the work of Pilots amongst girls and boys aged 5-17 years. It is a non-uniformed, Church based, ecumenical organisation with 220 companies in this country. It aims to help children grow mentally, physically and spiritually and lead them to a personal commitment to Jesus and to foster a sense of belonging to the world-wide Church.

DISTRICT REVIEW GROUP.

The Secretary proposed a resolution which after some discussion was passed "That a small group comprising Rev.Brian Stone, Mrs.Kay Mcintosh and Mr.Brian Brazier be formed, to study the Ministerial deployment in Sussex West District and to bring its recommendations for the best use of available and future resources to the District Council by the November council meeting 1994 at the latest". If council accepts this group's report it would form the basis of our policy for the next 5/10 years. No scoping would take place until the review is completed, unless it is already in progress.

#### A NEW YEAR MEDITATION.

Most of us enjoy visiting gardens, especially in the Spring when the fresh new growth appears.

When God made Man and Woman He put them in a garden, the first mentioned in the Bible — the Garden of Eden. This garden was perfect, and so was the weather!

Along comes the Devil - Satan, and spoilt it all because he persuaded Rve to eat of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, which God had forbidden to be eaten of. You can read about this in Genesia, chapter 2.

After that the weeds started to grow, and ever since gardening has been hard work because of this act of disobedience so long ago.

Our lives can be likened to a garden. We can produce the fruit of the Spirit. See Galatians 5 vv 22/23. After they have bored a hole the damage is done. Some sins are apparent and some are hidden.

The daily life of the Christian should be like the Ants, Ladybirds, Bees and Worms. Useful in however a small or hidden way.

During December we have celebrated the birth of our Lord Jesus, our Saviour, who came into this world from heaven to save mankind from sin.

He was in a very different garden before he was crucified the garden of Gethsemene. He was only a young man - about the same age as our eldest son. He did not want to die, naturally speaking, but He obeyed His Pather in Heaven, Matthew chapter 26, so that sin which began in the Garden of Eden should be conquered for ever. John chapter 3 v 16.

In Solomon's Song we read of another garden which speaks figuratively of the Lord Jesus and His bride - those who love Him, being together in communion - set apart from the world, and leading on to the wonderful place described in Revelation 22, where all those who have put their trust in the Lord Jesus Christ as their Saviour and Lord will be for ever.

Another tree of life is mentioned which will bear twelve fruits every month and the leaves of the tree for the healing of the nations. Behold I come quickly, V 7.

December 1993

On 5th January 1994 I will wave goodbye to England and head off for Cameroon! Yes, the flights are all booked, for both Andrea and myself, and preparations are in full swing. We hope to be in Congo to celebrate Easter.

The past two months have been full of suspense and surprises, as we wondered whether we would be able to leave in January, and as God made it clear that January is His timing for us. I was doubtful as to whether I would have the financial support I need, but God has proved that He is well able to provide, through the generous giving of churches and individuals.

As you may remember, I spent the month of October at the Wycliffe Centre with Andrea, learning how to do linguistic surveys. This is a complex, yet increasingly important subject, since language situations are constantly changing around the world. Are some languages "dying out"? When is a language not a language, but merely a dialect? How do you decide when an individual or a people group can understand Scripture "adequately" in their second language? Such questions are not easy to answer, but they must be addressed in order to decide on the right priorities for translation projects.

During October Andrea and I received a communication from Congo, informing us that one of the Wycliffe members there will be leaving his project, and asking us whether we would prayerfully consider taking over from him. This is the very same project, based in a village called Ngo, which I visited when I was in Congo at the beginning of 1992! The other alternative for us is to work with the Mbochi people a bit further north, in a place called Boundji. Again, a family has been working on this language for several years, but now the family are based in Brazzaville, and they would like another team to locate in the village and work on the same language, so that more progress can be made.

It now seems unlikely that we will start a new language project in the far north of Congo, accessible only by plane. Instead, we will be able to reach our location by road. Finances allowing, we will buy a second-hand jeep from the person who is leaving the Ngo project. Furthermore, in both Ngo and Boundji there is a house where we could live, already equipped with solar panels!



Whichever language project we go into, we will have to do language learning initially, but we will probably start translation work and promoting the use of the Scriptures in churches much sooner than had we started a project "from scratch"! # New Moderator - Andrea Adams

Andrea was brought up in a small village outside Barnsley, Yorkshire, UK (as a young person she was an avid Barnsley Football Club supporter!). Following secondary education she went to teacher training college and qualified to teach Religious Education and art and design. It was while at college that she changed allegiance from being an Anglican to become a Congregationalist.

Andrea has possibly a unique record of having taught in every sector of education. She began her career teaching in a multiracial secondary school in Leicester, Later she became head o f resources Leicestershire primary school. This was followed by a period with Christian Aid which entailed adult education. After obtaining a BA (Ilons) in Law by part time study she lectured in



commercial law at a college of further education before moving to Leicester Polytechnic as senior lecturer in law and head of the industrial placement unit in the polytechnic business school. Later the Polytechnic became De Montford University so Andrea gained three months of university experience! She has, however, taken early retirement and is now the town clerk of Southam, where her husband Graham is pastor as well as being General Secretary of the Congregational Federation. Andrea has a lively interest in mission and is the chairperson of the Congregational Federation's Mission and Society Committee and will serve as President of the Federation 1994/1995. She has attended CWM executive meetings in Guyana, New Zealand and the Netherlands when part of her responsibility was to represent women.

CWM Council meetings have taken her to Scotland, Korea and Jamaica, where she was overwhelmingly elected as Moderator, 1993-1995

Andrea has attended the CWM European Region Conference at Swanwick, UK for many years where she has often led the creative art group. In her little amount of spare time she enjoys painting and batik. Other church work has included writing for the National Christian Education Council and serving on the governing body of Northern College, Manchester, UK.

NewShare

Bible Society's prison ministry, which started as a oneoff appeal, has continued for five years - but now more money is needed to carry on the work. In 1988, supporters donated such a generous sum (£125,000) that it enabled the work to continue all this time, along with helping other Bible prison ministries overseas.

n attractive booklet, called God Help Us!, which includes Mark's Gospel, questions, and a tear-off answer card, has been specially produced for this ministry. The booklet is distributed to inmates through the Prison Service Chaplaincy, often on their reception to the prison. Those who attempt to answer the questions and then return the card to Bible Society receive a Good News Bible.

Philip Poole, Finance Director, explained, "In the middle of last year we ran out of the 20,000 booklets we had printed in 1988, and had another batch printed, but that has now used up all the funds.

#### Tremendous feedback

"It lasted a good long time but we are still getting a steady flow of letters and tremendous feedback. The Prison Service Chaplaincy (part of the Home Office) are very keen that we continue and we see it as a valuable service which helps them. We are continuing the work out of general funds but if no more money is donated to the prison ministry there's no guarantee we'll be able to carry on."

Bible Society's prison ministry co-ordinator Grace Hempstock said that last year around 500 prisoners read the Gospel of Mark and requested a Bible or New Testament. She added, "Some people have written and explained how their lives were in a mess but now that they've got time on their hands they are picking up the pieces

of their lives again. It seems that many have had an earlier experience of God in some measure and these booklets again bring to life their need to reach out to God.

#### "Blessing in disguise"

"The reality strikes me again and again. These people have been given a prison sentence which somehow, in spiritual terms, proves to be a blessing in disguise-because they have time to sit down and read God's Word. Some have read the whole Bible in months, or helped three or four other inmates find faith, and I feel very humbled at how they express this. They are so ready to recognize that they have done wrong in life and that they need to be put right with God."

One prisoner is studying for a theology degree and Bible Society has supplied him with the necessary books at a special discount.



Dear Friends.

The news at the start of this year was full of disasters; the war still raging in Bosnia, Bush fires in Australia, floods almost on our doorstep at Chichester. The pictures which always have the greatest impact, of course, are those of the people involved as they are forced to leave their homes and belongings and move to safety. For us, these people raise one very probing question, "what are the important things in our home?" Put another way, "what would you take with you if you were forced to leave your home because of war, fire or flood?" Of the things that surround you, how would you decide what to save? Would they be things of monetary or of sentimental value, and would you have much choice or would they merely have to be practical? Perhaps most of the time we never contemplate such questions, but we really do need to see how we value things from time to time, for in 1990 the people of Sarajevo probably saw no reason to contemplate this and even at Christmas the people of Sydney and Chichester probably never let the thought enter their heads.

The young girl from Sydney whose house had been destroyed raised the question in a different way, "all I have left is a husband, a dog and a spare T-shirt" she said. In that position where would we begin? Would we try to recreate exactly what we have now, replacing each thing as near as we could, or would we go for completely new, looking for a brand new start, leaving the past behind? It's a terrible thought to contemplate in many ways, yet we do need every once in a while to evaluate what is around us and to see just what is important to us.

The same is true of our faith of course. A faith which scripture says should be tested and refined in God's Holy fire. What do you want to preserve in your faith - just what is important? When I was younger there were many things I thought vital to my faith. As I get older I discover that there are fewer things, but those which remain are the things I would be prepared to die for. The central things in faith, of course, are those which lead us nearer and nearer to the Holy God who is at the heart of faith and I find are the insights into Jesus' teaching which the Holy Spirit gives. Like the possibility of disaster, man-made or natural, making us look at our earthly possessions to see just which are vital, we should be looking at our spiritual possessions in the same way to try to find which are of real importance to us. Only then will we fully appreciate all that we have and be able to come before God with a real sense of thanksgiving for all He provides. Only when I know what I cannot do without will I value all that I have.

During a news bulletin from Australia, one man was heard to say "there is nothing that  $\underline{\text{man}}$  can do, we just have to wait for the wind to die down." A very profound statement, one which states clearly our dependence on God, no matter how in control we feel we will be or can be.

In Chichester again on the news another man said "one minute things were fine, the next minute we were under water. There was nothing we could do about it." Realisation again of how  $\underline{we}$  are not in control. God is in control - how much do we let go and let God? Let us look this month at what we think is really important so that when trouble or storms come, we will know Who is in control.

Please continue to pray for us as we seek God's leading in all that we do.

#### DO WE EXPECT TOO MUCH OF OUR EVANGELISTS?

Churches can place too much pressure on evangelists to boost their congregations, said the organisers of the annual Rvangelist's Conference arranged by Evangelical Alliance held at Swanwick 6-8 December 93. 'The clamour for instant results can place intolerable strain on evangelists who are following a lifetime's call and for whom evangelism is not a five minute wonder, 'explains Stuart Pascal of Saltmine Trust, and vice-chairman of the Evangelists' Conference. 'I am worried that the pressure on evangelists to bring great numbers of people to faith every time they visit a church will grow as Christians make a final effort to capitalise on the Decade of Evangelism during its closing years.' This year's conference was entitled 'Here for the long haul - together.' and Michael Green spoke about the stress and pressures felt by evangelists. Lessite Newbigin addressed those present on the subject of spreading the Christian faith in a pluralistic society. Schools work, handling publicity and spirituality were among the seminar topics tackled this year.

YOUNG PROPER WEED SUPPORT.

'Society that has lost respect for life should not be surprised when a two-year-old is picked up on the streets and is murdered,' said David Alton, W.P. to a conference arranged by Crusaders. More than 200 dignitaries, including bishops, Kriss Akabusi and prominent figures from media, industry and youth organisations heard him link the violent acts of young people with the 'cultures of violence' portrayed in the media and T.V.

#### Few dentists

Zambia has only 47 dentists of whom 24 work for the government. Another 69 are needed. No dentists are trained locally, says the Chief Dental Officer, but the Dental Training Centre, which has a three year course for clinical officers and technicians, could be upgraded. Zambians' good teeth have been ruined by sugar and 65% suffer from caries.

# Essential broadcasting

The Presbyterian Church in Taiwan (PCT) has plans to form a communications company to draw up and produce religious programmes which then may be sold and broadcast on cable television.

The programmes will be Bible centred and include items about faith, as well as political and social issues. The aim is to spread PCT's beliefs and principles.

### Hope

Parts of Matabeleland, Zimbabwe, are still in need of food relief as the good rains most of the country enjoyed last season did not materialise. People watch the sky and some begin to plant. Churches hold services of prayer for rain. Everyone waits in hope. A second good rainy season would be a blessing. Another drought, when the nation has not yet recovered from the last one, would be a disaster.

#### CENTRAL WORTHING TORCH FELLOWSHIP

The above-named Fellowship meets on the first Saturday of each month (except January) at St. Columba's Church Hall, St. Michael's Road, Worthing at 2.30pm.

We are a gathering of blind and partially-sighted people with sighted helpers who feel led by God to serve Him in this way. We have a relaxed time of singing with braille and giant-print hymn books. There is usually a soloist or group of singers and a speaker to give a message from the Scriptures. After this there are refreshments with tea, cakes, sandwiches etc., all lovingly provided and served by those who feel led to help in this way. We are normally on our way home soon after 4pm.

We have between 40-50 blind and partially-sighted members, most of whom require transport. Our mini-bus driver, a lady, is in <u>need</u> of someone to help her. We would point out that the sliding door of the mini-bus is quite heavy to open and close, so it would require someone reasonably strong - preferably a youngish man.

Another <u>urgent need</u> is for a treasurer for our Group. This does not involve a lot of work but it would mean being present at our Saturday gatherings and our Committee meetings which are held on the Wednesday morning immediately following our Saturday gathering. Our present treasurer, owing to ill-health, is finding it very stressful to carry on.

Yet <u>another need</u> is for able-bodied friends to help in the preparation of the Church Hall before the meeting, by putting out tables and chairs. Those responsible at present for this work are quite elderly and find it difficult at times. Those who may offer to meet this need will have to be at the Church soon after 1.30pm.





#### Dear Friends,

Here we go again writing our contribution to Chronicle, almost at the last minute, giving thanks that it will be typed without delay so that it will be handed in before the deadline. Of course, it should have been done yesterday, or last week, so that everyone could rest easy knowing that at least the first page was done. Now there are all sorts of reasons why it is being done now; the important meeting on ministry; the baptismal couple who needed visiting; preparing the services for Sunday; the Mission Committee meeting, and perhaps others. All of these reasons do have a degree of truth about them, but in another sense they are just excuses. The truth is really that there was a note on last week's calendar, but the task was put off and put off. There seems to be no real excuse.

Really much of life is spent in making excuses for ourselves or for others. "We don't get many to our services at this time of the year because of the bad weather." "There are not many here this evening, they will be taking advantage of the nice evening to get on with the gardening jobs." Such are the comments we sometimes hear and share. What we really mean is that our meetings and services simply do not attract as many people as we would like, and rather than face up to this we make excuses to ourselves and others. This is not only dishonest, it is also dangerous, as often we are avoiding the reality of the situation. For while there are always people who would love to come and share in all the life of our church each time we meet together, there are those who are challenging us to make what we do so relevant that they will want to be there rather than making excuses. Perhaps we can share a poster we once saw outside a church.



Of course, we are all busy, but we do need to give time for God before it is too late. The books we are using for tent give us the chance to share a little time each day and, hopefully, after Easter we will not make excuses but continue to give a few minutes to draw near to our Lord. We all discover that we cannot do everything we want in a day - there are rarely enough hours. (We are discovering that visiting everyone is taking much longer than we had planned and certainly longer than we had hoped, but we are still persevering and will see everyone as soon as possible). We do, however, need to give time to God each day in our private prayers and together in worship and doing His work. None of us are able to make excuses to our God who calls us into the fullness of life with Him.

Please continue to pray for us as we seek God's time above all else.

#### THE ARUNDEL COMMUNION SET.

Members and friends will have noticed that the Arundel Communion Set has graced our Communion Table recently.

Our Church acquired the Set some 14 years ago after the United Reformed Church at Arundel had closed.

The Church, called 'Trinity Chapel', in Tarrant Street, was originally a Congregational Church, but later combined with the Baptists. When the United Reformed Church was formed the Baptists decided to build their own Church, leaving a small congregation of 12 - 20 people with a vast building in need of major repairs. In those days the Church was part of the West Sussex Area Ministry and did not have its own Minister.

The Communion Set, presented by a member of Trinity Chapel, to our congregation, is in fine silver plate and inscribed 'Trinity Chapel 1843'. It consists of 2 Chalices, 1 Flagon, 1 plate on pedestal and 2 other plates, housed in a substantial wooden box. It is hoped that the Set can be used much more frequently when the problems of secure storage have been resolved.

#### Dear folks at G.U.R.C.

Hello from Cameroon! I was really happy to arrive here after the stress of packing up in London and the tiring journey. However, I was able to meet up with another Wycliffe friend in Paris, and we got off very lightly at Cameroonian customs. Sometimes people have to totally empty out their suitcases, but we were not even asked to open ours! It was good to be met by Andrea, already tanned from two days in Africa, and looking relaxed.

Right now we are being orientated to African life - we already tasted "bush meat" - porcupine, palm rat, monkey and antilope - and I've had my first bout of diarrhoea! Today we started learning a few expressions in the language spoken in this area - Ewando - so that we can greet people at the market, etc. It's very useful to learn how to buy and prepare food here (e.g. we soak our fruit and vegetables in bleach). We are also having lectures on health, and preparing for a week of camping on the beach (!), after which we will travel to a village to help dig a well.

I'm also having orientation to American life, since 8 North American families (with lots of children) are taking the orientation course. There is also a Swiss-German couple, and one other British girl. We are all living in close quarters, so we need to be very gracious and sensitive to one another - in any case, privacy is far less important in Africa! Next month we will be divided up and sent off to live with Cameroonian families for a while.

As you may have heard on the news, the CFA franc (the currency used in Cameroon, Congo and 12 other African countries) has just been devalued by 50%, which is causing some instability and significant price rises. This is hard for Africans who already earn very little and have to feed large families.

Please continue to pray for peace in Congo, particularly Brazzaville. As well as political instability there are increased ethnic tensions, and this has errupted into violence on a number of occasions recently. Andrea and I are pleased to be able to get to know two American families here on the orientation course who will also be working in Congo afterwards. At the moment it's still not clear whether we will work with the TEKE people or the MBOCHI people (remember the map on the OHP at my commissioning service??) So far, neither ourselves nor the other family involved (the Dawsons) have strong feelings about which project God is calling us to.

Greetings to you all! I'm enjoying the sun (although not the mosquitos!) and the assurance of being where God wants me to be! With love,

#### THE LEPROSY MISSION

The total donations for the Leprosy Mission for 1993 from members and friends of Goring URC amounted to £589.52 and on behalf of the Mission and the Worthing Branch Committee we give our grateful thanks. Of this sum, £19.03 was given, over the year, by the 5th Worthing Girls' Brigade and this money will be used for children's work. The rest will go towards the 1993 target for the Worthing Afea of £11,500 for the project proposed for the Leprosy Control Unit at Rayagada, Koraput District, Orissa, India.

This is a tribal area and TLM has to go through the village chief and elders for permission to use puppet shows in order to make the people aware of the harm that untreated leprosy can do. It is also a new move forward for the Missian to carry out a Leprosy Control programme, to survey education and to give treatment.

Rayagada is situated between Orissa and Andra Pradesh and is the first of TLM programmes in Orissa State. It is estimated there are 2,500 people here with leprosy and the project is for 5 years initially, possibly extending by another 3 years. The project target of £11,500 is to provide 7 motor-cycles and fuel, publicity material, medicines and supporting drugs for use by TLM personnel in the treatment of leprosy sufferers in this area.

We are sorry the total amount raised towards the target by the Worthing Branch is not yet available.

#### A READY WRITER (Psalm 45. 1)

A sixteen-year-old schoolgirl was so moved by the need for Bibles in Eastern Europe that she wrote out the entire New Testament by hand (in 14 days!) and by sponsorship raised £127 to provide some.

I propose to do likewise, not necessarily for Eastern Europe but for some country where the need is great, my aim being to quadruple that amount. "The New International Version" would be used, and the time-span is not determined.

The New Testament contains 203 chapters, and sponsorship would mean paying a certain sum for each chapter. Children, students, the unemployed and others with little money could contribute 1p per chapter; some others could afford much more. Individuals, families and groups could participate.

Promises of support should be given to me or to our Church Treasurer, Mr Roy Gooderham, who will also collect the money.


This venture has been approved by the Elders and by the Missionary Committee. (Of course, sponsorship is not confined to members of our Church and congregation.)

Dear Friends,

Easter is the time in the church for our joy to shine through. Good Friday with its solemnity and its remembrance of how Jesus died for each one of us in the great act of love which God has for individuals and the world gives way to the empty tomb of Easter Day and the Resurrection.

This joy is one which Christians can find hard to explain to others and yet is a joy which does not need an explanation, but should simply be seen by the whole world. The people of Jerusalem must have wondered about the disciples who made the first claim that Jesus had risen, for they would see the change in their lives from the sadness of watching the crucifixion, to their obvious joy in what they now claimed. To we who live in 1994, it is perhaps more difficult to show the despair the disciples must have felt on Good Friday (for we know what is to come), but the joy of the Resurrection is as new and exciting each year to those who believe. We do not always make people wonder in the same way now as did the early disciples, and this seems to me a very sad thing.

Easter is about turning death into life. It is about the victory of our Lord. It is a victory we all share in, and a victory we must proclaim to others. The age in which we find ourselves sees people looking at Easter as the beginning of spring with winter past. People see the new life of Easter in the blossom coming to the trees and the bulbs coming up in the garden. The joy and hope is that winter has passed and summer waits around the corner - the dead months in nature are giving way to the months of living things. When the followers of Jesus began to spread their Gospel, their Good News of Life, they came across people who thought in just this way, and they used these ideas to bring understanding of the importance of the Resurrection and the dawning of new hope. Of course, people wondered at what they said; they probably thought it strange to talk of a man dying that life should come. Yet the Gospel spread because it was true.

The Gospel also spread because people believed it was worth sharing, and indeed felt God had called them to share. This year too many people will give no thought to Jesus at Easter; too many will look to false gods to bring them joy at this time. So I believe we stand, as did those first disciples, surrounded by people who will laugh at what we are proclaiming, who will scoff at us for our faith, and just as those early disciples, we must rise to their challenge and show the truth in what we are saying. We must begin, perhaps, not with pious words which make us feel that we are superior to others, but simply by showing the joy that Easter Day brings to our lives. We must show the whole world on this great day that death has turned into life and darkness has given way to light in all that we do. Joy is not always an easy thing to show, but if we let God lift our hearts this Eastertide, the whole world will see and wonder at our joy in Jesus' victory.

Please continue to pray for us that we may live life in the full Resurrection joy.

#### Southern Province Synod - 12 March 1994.

The Spring Synod was held this year at Walthamstow Hall URC School in Sevenoaks. Opening Worship was led by Revd A Wharton, Minister of St. John's Hill URC, Sevenoaks. Bible Study was led by Revd J. Loveitt, Minister of Dulwich Christ Church and Herne Hill, and based on Deuteronomy 6: 1-9 and 2 Corinthians 4: 1-9.

It would be impossible to include in this report all the matters dealt with, so for those requiring further information Synod papers will be available in the Vestibule. The following were included in the Notices.

- 1. The organisers of the Women's World Day of Prayer would be grateful for feedback from inviduals and from churches.
- 2. A residential seminar 'Managing Conflict in Churches' is to be held 10-12 May '94.
- 3. The Bicentary Celebrations of the Council for World Mission will be on 12-14 July '95.
- 4. The Christian Aid booklet, 'Aid for Change' was recommended to Church members.
- 5. Revd. Frank Cochrane related a number of initiatives undertaken at Brighthelme. 'Expanding into the Community', through which 100-120 homeless in Brighton have been fed each day. Counselling for those addicted to gambling. Development of the individual through the Prince of Wales Trust. £2000-£4000 is needed to fund these projects.

Following the 'Story from Sussex', related at the October Synod, we had a 'Story from Medway' in the form of a new version of Snow White. in which an analogy was drawn between the growth impaired individuals and seven churches. Grumpy was the church asked to give £24000 to District, Happy was the one prepared to go its own way, Bashful loved the Lord but lacked confidence to tell others and Sleepy were the others. In these circumstances the 'happy-ever-after' scenario is a most unlikely ending. The District Council (Snow White) has frozen all ministerial appointments, shared concerns with the Ministers involved and 'Trio' was presented in all the churches. Three elements for future action resulted.

- 1. An end to the view that Ministers are 'owned' by one church. Ministers must be seen to be appointed to the whole District.
- 2. Every church should have a recognised leader, not necessarily an Ordained Minister, but having access to an Ordained Minister.
- 3. Churches should be encouraged to work together to consider arrangements different from those already in existence.

Away from Medway, churches were challenged to consider how they should plan and when; many District Councils may be forced to say things to churches that they do not want to hear.

Revd John Titlow was received by the Moderator as the Convenor of the Pastoral Care Committee for the Medway Churches.

The afternoon session was mainly devoted to a cross-committee group presentation of resources with the title 'Developing the Faith'. The presentations were, in fact, a pot-pourri of the work of the departments of Church and Society, World Church and Mission, Youth and Children's Work, Finance (Advocacy and TRIO) and Communicating the Faith through Music i.e. ways in which music can enhance preparation for and during Worship.

The cross-committee group presentation was a noble effort by all those leading it but they were required to make these presentations in too little time, 12 minutes each and generally with insufficient space, were severely handicapped, particularly the man endeavouring to explain the successes churches had through TRIO against a background of music and singing in the Hall in which both were located.

Synod closed with Worship led by the Moderator, Revd David Helyar.

#### ORGANISING THE CHURCH FOR GROWTH AND MISSION

#### 1) INTRODUCTION

At the time when I was called to be minister there was interest in how I saw the church being organised in terms of its committee structure and its effective response to growth. I submit these thoughts for discussion in order that we may be organised for growth and mission, in order that we may set in place a structure that will not only meet our present needs but also will enable us to grow numerically and in terms of our commitments without overtaxing our structure, indeed perhaps such a structure may enable and encourage growth.

This is in no way a criticism of the structures that are in place but is an attempt to build on what we have, and indeed to draw on what may have been in place before, in order that we may move forward.

#### 2) EVERY MEMBER MINISTRY

Underlying this structure is the belief that we, the whole body of the church, share together in ministry. It was D.L. Moody who said, "I would rather put ten men to work than do the work of ten men." We also need to recognise that God's Spiritual gifts are given to His body, the church, and that corporately we will have all the gifts we need to engage in the Lord's work even though one individual may not have all the gifts. We need to recognise the gifts in others and enable them to use their gifts, rejoicing in what God is doing rather than giving in to jealousy or resentment that our gifts lie in other areas. We also need to learn how to trust one another so that we honour the gifts they have and do not seek to have all decisions pass through our hands

Every member ministry does make great demands on a church but is a concept which I believe is God's way of structuring His people. (Acts6:1-7)

#### 3) APPOINTMENTS BY CHURCH MEETING

The church meeting would appoint the officers of the church, the elders and people to serve on five church committees. (Pastoral, Finance, Fabric, Family, and Outreach and Evangelism committees.)

The elders would be chosen according to their gifts, some to serve as pastors, others as administrators and would be nominated for specific roles. Those with pastoral gifts would share in the responsibilities of caring for the fellowship, while those with administrative skills would work through the church committees along with the representatives appointed by church meeting.

Because this is an important matter for the church, the postponement of elders elections in 1994 will allow the necessary time for discussion by all interested members.

#### 5TH WORTHING GIRLS' BRIGADE

It is very nice to have our Captain, Margaret Craghill, back again. Although she is still in a lot of pain at times, she is a lot better.

This Session is nearly over now, all Sections having been very busy. The Explorers have been working hard for a Spiritual point for their badge. For this they have learnt a 'thank you' prayer or made a joint collage showing things they should say thank you for. They also learnt a 'sorry' prayer and illustrated it in their own way, wrote a prayer in their own words and learnt a grace.

At the moment they are making Easter cross cards for their Love and Care Point.

#### **VIDEOS**

I have on loan two new videos from "Eurovangelism". The first, "Action for Albania", shows the Continent's poorest nation emerging from decades of self-imposed isolation. Horrifying scenes emerged in an economic situation far worse than that of any former Soviet bloc nation. Factories not functioning for lack of raw materials; schools without books or supplies; hospitals without medicines; infant deaths five times the European average.

Spiritual poverty resulted from the closure of all Churches, Mosques and Synagogues, with total suppression of all religious expression.

Albania's sad situation is the backdrop for this documentary of hope and encouragement, showing how a little help can go a long way. (This video is not for sale). Running time 27 minutes.

The second video is "Children Amid Chaos". As East Europeans struggle to recover from the appalling legacy of a failed ideology, children are caught in the crossfire of conflicting "solutions". This video shows what Christians in the West are doing to alleviate suffering, with food, medical supplies and relief goods for innocent young victims of war. The spiritual vacuum created by long suppression of religious expression calls for the compassionate action Christians are uniquely equipped to provide.

Most moving is the story of a popular television presenter's conversion from Communism to Christianity, and graphic portrayal of her professional skills now being used to communicate the Good News of the Gospel into millions of Russian homes.

"Children Amid Chaos" provides encouraging and heart-warming confirmation of what can happen when Christians are moved with compassion to do something about it. (Running time 20 minutes).

A further video "Journey of a Lifetime", featuring the Holy Land, will be sent to me after it is premiered this month.

# **RUTH'S CHAT**

(from the FIELD)

# Life in Cameroon

I sit writing to you, the birds and insects are busy making their music outside my window in the African night. Sometimes a fing comes out and hops along the path, replacing the brightly coloured lizards that bask in the sun during the day. Grasshoppers, beetles. butterflies, praying mantises, centipedes. cockroaches insect-hunting is one of the favourite pastimes of the children on His Africa Orientation Course (AOC).

We spend time in the classroom, learning about tropical diseases and cultural adaptation, but we also get "hands on" experience of preparing menus, going to the market to buy food for everyone, tasting porcupine, palm-rat and monkey meat, helping run a Bible club for children, practising greetings in the local language, etc.

In January we spent 4 days camping at the coast, which involved digging latrines; making showers with a bucket, palm branches and bamboo; cooking over open fires, etc.

### Congo News

Two families here at AOC, as well as Andrea and myself, hope to travel to Brazzaville at the end of March to start our work there, but the situation in the capital is quite unstable at the moment. We are very sad to hear of ethnic tensions. and looting and shooting around Brazzaville. The devaluation of the currency (same currency in Cameroon) means that both economically and politically, things are very difficult.

We do not know right now how God will be exalted in Congo, but we are praying that He will bring good out of the situation. He is also the God of miracles and can bring about reconciliation and stability. We can only place the country in His hands.

At this stage we do not know whether we will be able to leave for Congo in March. It is possible that we will be advised to stay in Cameroon until things become more stable. The decision will have to be made by the Wycliffe Director in Congo. He really needs wisdom from God to make a good decision.



THANK-YOU to all of you who have written to me! I am no longer able to write personal notes on my newsletters, since a friend in England is photocopying them and mailing them out for me. However, I have appreciated your news and your prayers.

Being here IS a challenge. Although I have visited Africa twice before, this time it feels different, since I am here for much longer, and I need to make it "home", rather than being just a visitor. It will of course take time to make the adjustment.

"The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge." May you know the presence of the Almighty God with you!

The year 1993 was a successful year for the Church. This was due to strong unity exhibited by the members. It's my prayer that such atitude will continue dispite the change of leadership.





Dear Friends,

With the joy of Easter just behind us, I find myself looking towards Pentecost, for the Risen Jesus must now Ascend to take His place with His Heavenly Father; and yet, through the power given by the Holy Spirit, His presence remains with us. Pentecost is a day of joy and celebration as God once again pours out His power to His people. It is a day of new beginnings in our relationships with our Heavenly Father.

Some see Pentecost as the 'birthday' of the church, the day when the followers of Jesus became the beginnings of the church as the Spirit touched their lives. It is interesting that the Acts of the Apostles records the first actions of this new 'church' to be their attempt to share with others what had happened. Those who would contain the church to an hour on Sunday should take note. The new 'church' saw a spiritual desert which they aimed to fill with the Good News of Jesus. We too can look out on desert conditions.

The day of Pentecost saw the Apostles gathering a crowd because people were curious to see what was happening. They were greeted with confusion and derision, but by the end of the day about three thousand had been added to their number. There will be many in the church today who want to tell you that this was an event of long ago and that it doesn't happen now. Well, gladly it does happen today even if it's not our experience. Equally there will be those who will say that such a harvest must have produced many nominal converts who soon lost their way, and that we shouldn't set too much store by numbers anyway. Well, Jesus Himself knew the dangers as God's word was spread – read the parable of the sower (Luke chapter 8 vv 5-8) and its explanation (vv 11-15); and why disregard numbers? Surely God wants to draw people to His love. What rejoicing there must have been among the Apostles and what joy that God had so blessed their work with such a rich harvest.

People have always needed to hear that they are loved. There is always a need to show God's love to those who haven't been able to hear before. Pentecost provides us with just such a reminder. Once again let us remember that the church is an organisation that looks out. The day we stop doing that we will no longer be the church. The whole nature of our call is to bring the Good News to those who have not heard, to share what God has done through Jesus with all those we know. After all it was Jesus who said "Go, then, to all peoples everywhere." The Apostles took that task seriously as God equipped them at Pentecost.

Today Jesus commissions us to continue this task of sharing with those whom we meet. So let us look at our opportunities: for some there are our families or neighbours (literally the people next door); for some there are the people we meet at work; and for others there are those we meet in our leisure pursuits, be it at night class or sporting activity, or just when we go out for a meal or a drink. There is not one of us who does not know somebody outside the church and they are the crowd we should gather. Will three thousand come? Perhaps not, but why not? God will put His hand on what we do if we are willing to be led by Him, and who can say what God's power can achieve? Pentecost is a time of new relationships with God, with our neighbours and, of course, with one another.

Please continue to pray for us as we seek God's purpose in our lives, since the events of Pentecost did not end when everyone went to bed - you need to read on!

#### STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE.

Our application on 24th February 1994 to install a set of 12\* high non-illuminated letters on the east elevation of the Church has been approved by the Borough of Worthing on 28th March, for a period of five years.

QUINQUENNIAL SURVEY: - Following consultation with Mr. Colin Redman we have now instructed builders to carry out repairs to the concrete gutters and echelon walls. R.J.Surridge, Builders, will repair gutters for £486.00 (labour and scaffolding only). Commercial Protective Systems Ltd., of East Sussex will supply the Thortex Wall-Tech materials for £546, plus carriage. They have provided a detailed specification. Mr. Surridge will repair the cracks on the echelon wall based on the specification provided by Mr. Redman. Cost of repairs is £46.50. Only ONE of the echelon walls is to be repaired. The repair is to be left for a period of 12 months and if it proves successful then the other 7 echelon walls will be repaired.

The lowest estimate for hot water heaters in some cloakrooms was £904.75. The Committee felt the cost was too high and we will be undertaking the work ourselves.

The floor of the stage has a number of splinters. The cheapest way of solving this problem is to lay carpet. A member has given the carpet and a carpet fitter will trim and fix the carpet for £50.00 plus VAT.

Our list of priorities for 1994 budget is :-

Repair gutters and cracks.

- 2. Church members to redecorate the Sanctuary.
- 3. Replace stained glass windows.

Renewal of the Church heating system and carpeting the Sanctuary would be outside the scope of our budget.

The Committee is arranging for library and bookstall to be transferred to vestibule area at front of Church.

RED GROUP

We started our week by finding out about Jesus and learnt a poem to share with everyone on Sunday. Just as we can only see air when it is inside a balloon or blowing a windmill, so we can see Jesus by the way He changes our lives. We made windmills and planted cress seeds to remind us of Jesus. Wednesday we made and cooked bread rolls after which there seemed to be more flour on the floor than the tables! Next we heard the story of the boy with the five loaves and two fish and talked about the thoughts we put into our minds. We finished by playing a loaves and fishes team game. Thursday began with the leaders and helpers showing the children items that were valuable to them. This was followed by the story of ME, the lamb who got lost and was found by the shepherd, and how special we each are to Jesus. We finished the morning making books about ourselves.

On the last day we thought about Jesus' friends and what it means to be friends of Jesus. We then made a large collage to show how Jesus cares for each of us. We divided into four teams each led by a Gladiator, YELLOW GROUP Warrior, Cobra, Hunter and Saracen. During the week points were awarded to each team by Jet. We looked at the life of JESUS, using a football quiz game. The first half-birth of Jesus, second half-His death and resurrection. During half time we looked at Jesus ministry and as a drama acted the story, Jesus heals a paralysed man. We also talked about how we know Jesus is alive. After prayer we ended by making a finger puppet. Wednesday we looked at what we put IN our minds and bodies, who do we trust? Our story was Jesus heals a roman officer's servant. We then made bottle gardens. Thursday we looked at ME, how precious we are to God, that He made each one of us different. We heard the story of the feeding of the 5,000. We then had great fun making plaster casts of our hands. Friday morning we watched a short drama followed by the story of Zacchaeus as we learnt what it means to have JESUS IN ME. We put our fingerprints on to the hand casts. The prizes for the best team went to Warrior!.

GREEN GROUP

The green group consisted of 18 ten and eleven year olds plus leaders. We (which includes the leaders) enjoyed each morning—how could we not enjoy it when we were participating in such activities as making a gift box, a Jesus placard, a plaster of Paris hand (which was then painted using only red, yellow and green, the JIM colours—of course!), a clipboard and a bread roll each. We also wrote and performed a rap, and made a space station out of a blanket, a broom, a washing up bowl and other bits! But most importantly of all (in addition to many relationships which were started with the kids), were the short bursts of 'Christian input' where the children learnt; that the Bible was actually a true and reliable historical document which is still relevant to them today; that they were unique, (they studied their fingerprints to realise this) and special to God; and that they could in fact get to know Jesus personally, which was what the holiday club was all about J.I.M. JESUS IN ME.



Dear Friends.

The church meeting in April made two decisions I would like to write about and encourage your support.

First and most important, at least in my view, was the decision to have a monthly day of prayer. Most important because unless we can give time to come before God and listen to Him in prayer, then nothing we do is of any value. It was Lord Tennyson who said "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of", and as we come together before God we need to ask ourselves what we dream of, and wait to see what God wants to do. This really will be a day of prayer from 7 am until 9 pm, although the final hour will bring the day to a close in a time of praise. There will be specific themes for different parts of the day to help us, but no one needs to feel that we can only pray for those areas of our life at these designated times, the hope being that we will give time to come before God in prayer for our church and its people, and share what we hear with one another. You must feel free to come and go as you are able through the day. This is not new, but is, I believe, an important decision we have made for the future life of the church, so please support this proposal if you can – we begin on June 9th.

Secondly, we decided to go ahead with replacing the heating system, which will cost us about £17,500. To help us finance this we have applied to the URC for a grant and a loan so that we can go ahead. However, we also decided to have a gift day on Sunday, 19 June when we shall seek your financial support for this work. We shall, of course, take money in any form, but we shall also like promises of money, interest free loans, or promises for regular payments to help us repay any loans we incur. The decision to hold a gift day is what I wish to address here, for I believe this too is an important moment for the church. Those at the church meeting left, I hope, believing that the decision had been made as God had directed us, and we have to believe that God does want us to have this work done. We must also know that God will provide for all the needs of His church and on this occasion it is up to us to be the agents that will allow Him to provide. I am very aware that many people have thought very seriously about their level of weekly giving over the past few months, and that to some people this need for extra money will not be the best news in Chronicle. Yet we all need to remember that God will honour our giving to Him, and that it is His will that we should not only give generously, but cheerfully. We must all in a prayerful spirit seek what God wants of each of us in this matter, and respond accordingly. I hope that we shall be able to announce the result of this gift day towards the close of the evening service - and we shall follow this with a time of praise for all God has provided.

Now let us talk about sharing gifts. Not all will be at the prayer day for 14 hours; indeed I suspect that most of us will spend only the time that we feel we can afford to give when we sort out our other priorities. Yet most of us know we can give some time during the day and will try to give as much as possible. The same is true for the gift day; most of us will give what we feel we can afford once we have sorted out our other priorities, Yet most of us know we can give something and will try to give as much as possible. All I ask is that we do all seek God's will for us in these matters of time and money, remembering that God will honour all we give to Him. This really is a gift sharing exercise.

I have been privileged to see many of the things people have made as Peter and I have been visiting so I know a lot of what to expect already and pray that you won't be disappointed with the quality and variety of what we can produce. Of course some things like cakes and preserves can only be made for the day unless you can make something special that you are prepared to take orders for.

This may all seem very new and revolutionary but it does work. If you want to know more about it or what sort of things you could make then don't hesitate to get in touch with me or Sheila and we will try to explain more.

# BIBLE EXPLORATION 1994. THEME: A Church Like Ours.

Earlier this year children in Junior Church, ranging from 6 - 12 years, once again followed the Bible Exploration Scheme set by the National Christian Education Council. We looked at passages in 1 Corinthians under headings like: People, Communion, the Church as a Body, and Mission, and saw how they relate to our church today. It was a challenging task both for the teachers as well as the children! A number of translation and literacy teams are working in NW Zaire and they need us to run a small "base" for them, deal with administration, guesthouse, finances, etc. A couple will come from the States to do this work in a year's time, so next Easter we would be able to come back to Congo to start our own language project.

As you can imagine it came as quite a surprise to us to be suddenly asked to go to Zaire, and it has taken us a bit of time to adjust to the idea, but we now feel that this is what God would have us do, and that it will be good to have the opportunity to serve other Wycliffe teams and to see what God is doing in the churches there. We will also learn to speak Lingala, which will be very useful for Congo.

Therefore, on 27th Andrea and I will take a plane to Bangui in the Central African Republic, and we will then be flown by "missionary plane" (owned the Mission **Aviation** Fellowship - MAF) across the border into Zaire. We will live in a town called Gemena. where the Wycliffe base is located, and we will divide between us the tasks administrator, centre hostess. kitchen supervisor, keeper, etc.


Gemena is a fairly isolated town with few goods coming in from outside, and post will be brought to us from Central African Republic by MAF plane. This means that the postal address you should now use when writing to me is in Central African Republic, not Zaire. Mail may take quite a long time to reach me, but please don't let that discourage you from writing!

I am grateful to God for the good time of orientation in Cameroon and for bringing us (and our barrels) safely to Congo. We especially praise God for bringing peace to Brazzaville at the present time. As Andrea and I trust Him for the year ahead, we are asking Him to:

  - \* give us grace to be good "servants" in our new jobs, so that the work of God in the area can progress.



Dear Friends,

We shall be into that holiday period for many when you are reading these words. Perhaps you are even reading them on your return. This is a time for relaxation and reflection for us all. Looking backwards is a strange thing really; indeed, time is strange the way it plays tricks on us and manages to dominate our lives. The calendar on my desk says Wednesday, 16th March! It has just appeared from under a great pile of papers and books as I have been sorting out my desk top. March seems a long time ago now and many things that were being prepared for then have now happened. This is true of much of life; we plan for the future and the planning becomes very important until the day comes and goes. It is now over twenty years ago that I was ordained and began my ministry in the church, with many plans and ideas. Some of these ideas have become practice within ministry and some of the plans we now work out as second nature as we work among you, while others have been abandoned or drastically altered as experience and time moulds the sort of people we all are.

Yet this surely is the nature of our faith and the way in which we proclaim the Gospel entrusted to us. We must make plans for the future and we must be prepared to examine them again as time passes. Ours is not a faith which stands still but is the proclaiming of the living, eternal God, a bold explanation in a world that is ever changing. Too often we forget that God wants to speak to our age; indeed He has some very important things to say to us all, yet we too often want to trap Him in history where we can confine Him and make Him manageable. However, God will not allow this to happen and rises up out of history to speak with us and challenge us today – this surely is one of the joys of our faith, the hallmark of a living faith.

So each of us must open our hearts and our ears to hear what God is saying, and at the same time open our eyes to see Him in the world and all the events we see around us. As we listen and seek God so we become aware of our responsibility to proclaim the coming Kingdom of Jesus and to prepare ourselves for that Kingdom. Twenty years ago at my ordination I was reminded that I have a responsibility for my own salvation as well as everyone else's, and of course this is true for us all. We need to pray and study our Bibles, on our own and in groups, as well as worship together. These things we neglect at our peril; indeed, maybe much of what is wrong with our age is that most people no longer do any of them. Yet, even many Christians no longer see these as important. In a recent conversation someone said "Of course, my father was a regular churchgoer; never missed a Sunday. We had to be there two, three times on a Sunday, but I don't go much now. The truth is, I'm too busy; and if I'm not too busy, I'm too tired. But I may go once occassionally and I try to live a decent life and do a good turn when I can." To this I replied, "I'm sorry for your son!"


Do you live as if Jesus will come soon? Are you prepared? We need to live as though Jesus is coming tomorrow, or even today! In our prayer life and Bible reading we should prepare ourselves and through our worship express our hope to the world. We must, of course, make plans for the future and our life and work together (perhaps that is why the desk is always in such a mess!), yet we must also be aware of the promise that Jesus will come again and be prepared for it – even on holiday.



- 1) <u>Ministerial Changes</u> BRIGHTHELM District approved Rev Frank Cochrane's move to St Georges URC Carlisle. HOUNSOM & PORTSLADE District approved Rev Peter McIntosh's move to be Director of Windermere Centre. CHRISTCHURCH, CHICHESTER District approved Rev Stuart Bidmead's move to Wilmslow URC, Cheshire. The District was grateful for all they had done and wished them God's blessings. PAGHAM Rev Marion Kennard appointed to the District for 3 years as non-stipendiary Minister with special responsibility for Pagham and linked with Rev Brian Sturtridge and with Rev Bob Murray in Brian's Sabbatical. The President led in prayer for them and for all the Churches involved and their Interim Moderators.

EXTRACTS FROM RVANGELISM TODAY JUNE 1994: -

LOGOS 2 plans to visit 5 ports in the British Isles during 1995! Dun Laoghaire, Ireland in March, Northern Europe April to June, Aberdeen and Newcastle in July, Cardiff and Southampton in August.

Operation Nobilisation U.K. Field Leader Dave Thomas has confirmed this, as have Church leaders in each city that the 4000 tons vessel will visit. Preparations are already being made in each location. Three million (3,000,000) people had visited the ship by May 1994.



Dear Friends,

It really is wonderful when you read in books or church magazines that people have prayed and discovered that God does great things. Often people in churches seem faced with problems that would test their faith and yet they move forward much stronger when they see what God can do in their midst. Well, we are always encouraged by what God does in other churches, but we are much more encouraged by what He does in ours, which is why we are still so excited about the gift day and the way God used the rather mundane matter of the heating system to show us just what a powerful Lord we have, and how He will use us, His people.

The result of the day was tremendous in itself, and our thanks go to all who gave as God enabled through money and through prayer. To achieve our target was really a cause for great rejoicing, but to do it in response to God's call to so many people was a real lesson for us as a church. God does not work by expecting each of us to do everything on our own; rather He wants us to be a body of believers who come together in His name, using the gifts and resources we have as individuals in a shared way. This means we must grow together and we must learn to trust one another to respond as God asks. This we believe was one of the greatest causes of rejoicing to come from the gift day as each one who had listened to God could be content with what they had done.

We have seen what God can do, and we have seen what God can do through His people together. It is easy to feel divided in a church the size of Goring; it is easy to be critical of others in the fellowship who seem to have different concerns to us; it is easy to get locked into our small areas of work and not ever know what others are doing. Yet here God has shown us that together we can do what He wants, that without knowing what response any individual has made we can all rejoice together. We are unable to judge anyone and so are able to share together in our praise. Let us learn from this that we should be content to praise God for all He does without letting our judgement of others detract in any way.

Now if God has done this in an area of money and buildings, let us pray that we can now go on to grow as we see God working with all the gifts and talents He has put in our midst. Now is the time for us all to begin to pray that God will direct us to find the right people to come forward in our new structure. We need to pray not only that we will find the right people to serve as elders and as church meeting appointments to our committees, but in every area of our life together. We need to recognise that there are all sorts of areas in which we need God's guidance to find the right people to do the right work for the Lord so that the right gifts are in the right area.

It is never too soon to start praying; that is one thing you learn from reading the books which speak of growth through faith, so we must begin to pray for God to show us the people He wants in every situation and be prepared to respond to His word just as we did over the gift day. The lesson, we believe, has been shown to us — God wants to do great things. God can do great things, but together in unity we must listen to what He says and trust one another to respond to what is heard. This must be the core of our prayers of thanksgiving and petition as we come before our Lord following this great time in our life together.

Yes, It's wonderful to read in books what God does in other churches, but how much greater to be involved with what He is doing here. Please continue to pray for us as God increases the vision of what He wants to do in this place.



Dear Friends,

During this month we will be asked to nominate people to stand as elders in the elections at the church meeting on December 8th. Can it be stated at the outset that the elders are not appointed by the minister, but elected by the church meeting under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Perhaps, however, it is appropriate to share the qualities we should be looking for as we come to these important decisions and offer nominations.

The most important consideration is that we nominate men or women of God. People in whom we see God's Spirit working. These are not necessarily very vocal, noticeable people; indeed, often they will be quiet, unassuming in their nature and, perhaps, their faith. However, they will be obviously people whose faith is important and whose love of Jesus should shine through all they do. Elders are to be spiritual leaders of the church: unless these qualities are seen in their lives we cannot expect them to lead, under God's direction.

We shall nominate some as Pastoral Elders. An easy test seems to be, could I share with this person, knowing that they would pray for my need? To do this we need to feel comfortable in their presence - that we will feel able to share, and to recognise that they see prayer as an important part of life - so that we will know they will pray for our needs.

We shall nominate some as Administrative Elders. Their task will be involved with the committee structure of our church. A test for such people could well be that they have an overview of the whole work of the church and have a real vision for the direction in which God is leading the church here in Goring.

There is one thing we must all now do and that is to pray earnestly that our church will call the people to eldership that God wants. The elders will need to be called by God and annointed with His Spirit as they lead us under His Power. So let us come to prayer that we may heed what God is saying.

Finally, perhaps you will be asked to stand and not recognise the qualities needed in yourself - that is, perhaps, not important as long as others do. You need to pray for God's confirmation. Maybe some of you will hear God call you and wonder what to do. In that situation do come and talk with Peter or any of the elders; we need to feel able to share all that God is saying about these important positions in His church.

So let us all turn to the Lord in prayer for His guidance; prayer which will need to continue throughout the months up to the elders' elections and beyond.

Across 177 Nations the first global March for Jesus saw colourful processions of praise or quiet prayer walks. In Tonga the King rededicated the Nation to Christ in front of 12,000 people. 850,000 danced and sang on the streets of San Paulo. 1,000,000 prayed in Seoul, Korea. 250,000 in Australia, and 1,500,000 in the U.S.A.

70,000 marched in London, 12,000 in Edinburgh, 5,000 in Cardill, 2,500 in Drogheda where all Christian religions met and prayed together.


# RUTH's CHAT

(from the FIELD)

Being the lightest passenger, I was strapped into the back seat of the 6-seater plane, with the luggage. There was certainly no room to swing a cat! The take-off was so smooth I hardly realised we'd left the ground. We saw the Ubangi River meandering beneath us as the MAF plane crossed over from Central African Republic Into Zaire. 45 minutes later we touched down in Gemena.

That was 3 months ago, and Gemena now feels like home - at least temporarily. It's a large fown with a few delapidated shops and a bustling market, selling brightly coloured cloth, second-hand clothing, charcoal and flrewood, a number of imported Chinese goods, and of course lood - rice, cassava, many green-leaf vegetables, corn on the cob, plaintain bananas, fish (fresh or dried), live chickens, freshly slaughtered pigs, etc.

Lingala learning has been keeping Andrea and me busy. Lingala is more widely spoken here than French, and thanks to the help and pallence of our language teachers and other friends, we are slowly making progress. We are also grateful for dictionaries and written grammars for Lingala, which do not exist in many other local languages.



Have you ever wondered what it would be like to move out of your house and into your garden shed? That's a bit what it felt like in June when Andrea and I moved in with a Zairean family for two weeks. Imagine sitting in a dark hut, lit by one paraffin lamp, eating your evening meal with rain dripping through the straw roof in several places, and your chickens, ducks and cat also sharing the room with you!

Running the Wycliffe guesthouse and dealing with administration is proving quite a challengel We want the house to feel welcoming for Wycliffe members coming in from their villages to recharge their batteries. Andrea is the guesthouse hostess and she has taken charge of the kitchen and purchasing supplies as well as organising the Zairean employees.

My responsibilities include: managing the cash box and making the books balance at the end of the month, paying the employees' salaries and taxes, driving people to and from the airport (I'm getting used to driving on the wrong - I mean, right side of the road and changing gear with my right handl), dealing with immigration and customs procedures, keeping in contact with village teams by radio, oversight of Wycliffe vehicles, etc.

People seem to get sick frequently. We have to advise sick employees and help them to get appropriate medical treatment. We also need to communicate clearly with them in Lingala and try to avoid cultural misunderstandings - not easy!

On a wider level, we rejoice that the whole Bible has now been translated into one of the local languages and should be published next year. Translation is steadily progressing in 2 other languages, and 2 further language projects are in their beginning stages. People are enthusiastic about learning to read and there are many adult literacy classes operating through the churches. Our desire is that God's Word will have a greater impact on people's lives as they are able to read it for themselves.



Dear Friends,

This month we would like to share three parables of Jesus and ask a question after each.

You are like light for the whole world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp and puts in under a bowl; instead he puts it on the lampstand, where it gives light for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine before people, so that they will see the good things you do and praise your Father in heaven.

(Matthew 5: 14-16)

Does our church shine with God's gifts of unity and love?

At that time the Kingdom of heaven will be like this. Once there was a man who was about to go on a journey; he called his servants and put them in charge of his property. He gave to each one according to his ability; to one he gave five thousand gold coins, to another he gave two thousand, and to another he gave one thousand. Then he left on his journey. The servant who had received five thousand coins went at once and invested his money and earned another five thousand. In the same way the servant who had received two thousand coins earned another two thousand. Then the servant who had received one thousand coins came in and said "Sir, I know you are a hard man; you reap harvests where you did not sow, and you gather crops where you did not scatter seed. I was afraid, so I went off and hid your money in the ground. Look! Here is what belongs to you."

"You bad and lazy servant!" his master said. "You knew, did you, that I reap harvests where I did not sow, and gather crops where I did not scatter seed? Well, then, you should have deposited my money in the bank, and I would have received it all back with interest when I returned. Now, take the money away from him and give it to the one who has ten thousand coins. For to every person who has something, even more will be given, and he will have more than enough but the person who has nothing, even the little that he has will be taken away from him. As for this useless servant – throw him outside in the darkness; there he will cry and grind his teeth."

Do we as individuals use the talents God has given us, and do we, as a church, recognise and respect the talents of others in the fellowship?

Jesus told them still another parable: The Kingdom of Heaven is like this. A woman takes some yeast and mixes it with forty litres of flour until the whole batch of dough rises.

(Matthew 13: 33)

Are we willing to be God's yeast in this place?

Please pray for our church as we continue to seek God's will and purpose for our fellowship.

# SUSSEX WEST DISTRICT COUNCIL MEETING AT PETWORTH URC ON 8.9.94

Opening devotions were led by the Minister, Brian Wroe, based upon 2 Corinthians 12, who shared his recent experiences of visiting the Reformed Churches of Ukraine and Hungary. Prayers were said for the widow of Rev Alan Whillis - Minister of Telscombe Cliffs, who died recently; for Wendy Walker after her kidney transplant; for Rev Marina Kennard non-stipendary Minister newly inducted into the District with responsibility for Pagham and for those Ministers moving away - Peter McIntosh, Stuart Bidmead and Frank Cochrane.

<u>DISTRICT APPOINTMENT</u> - Mr Roy Wearing of Saltdean as District Treasurer.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE EVANGELISM ENABLER - Rev Peter Southcombe.

In this decade of evangelism Peter has been appointed to disturb us into action to step out in faith to share the Word and to pray for growth. He is available for Elders/Church days and has much resource material. One idea is a "Badge Day" — and for people to be prepared to explain what the badge means.

PASTORAL CONCERNS OF CHURCHES

The Interim Report of the Patterns of Ministry is to be discussed in the Churches before it is discussed by the November District Meeting. Assembly decreed the timetable. All Brighton Churches will share in a Joint Service on the afternoon of 9th October followed by discussion.

Telscombe Cliffs - Rev George McCleeve appointed as Interim Moderator.

<u>Authorisation for Presiding at Communion</u> - At <u>Brighthelm</u>, Robert Jones, Margaret Ruxton & Ian Sinclair. At <u>Hounsom</u>, Bob Jackson & John Gillam.

Until December 1994 then to be reviewed. Concern was expressed over the uncertainty in this area. It would be discussed in November.

<u>Shelley Road</u> - Mobility scheme now in action and proving popular.

<u>Sompting</u> - Brian Dyer is recommended for training for the non-stipendiary ministry.

PROPERTY MATTERS - Approval was given to Lewes Road, Brighton to sell existing manse and buy a new one. Approval was given to lease the manse of Brighthelm during the interregnum. Goring was congratulated for raising the funds for a new heating system and not therefore needing a Provincial Loan/Grant.

FINANCIAL MATTERS - Ministry and Mission Fund - the Treasurer hopes to hear from the rest of the Churches soon about the amounts they will offer, but if those Churches follow the existing pattern then the District will be 6% short of its target.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY at Lancaster University July 7-11th 1994

Our representatives gave their impressions:-

Good fellowship, excellent worship. Sunday morning service broadcast on radio at which £2,000 was raised for Rwanda, Bible Study on 1 Peter in groups at the end of the morning session, the daily Fury Newsletter said it all and much was learned standing in the queues. This year's General Assembly Moderator Rev Jack McKelvey (formerly Principal of Northern College) gave an excellent address and next year's Moderator will be Rev John Reardon. Rev David Helyar was reappointed as Southern Province Moderator.

There were discussions and resolutions on the International Year of the Family, the arms trade and students grants and loans which are below the level of Income Support and Housing Benefit. Church members are asked to write to their MPs urging the Government to reconsider student grants and raise them above the official poverty level and to cover the costs of necessary books and equipment and to allow students to receive State Benefit with the rest of society. We are also encouraged to offer practical support to students in our own locality.

"Friends of Fury" has been set up for adults to support Fury and the new "Sounds of Fury" book has been published. There was an excellent presentation on TRIO - the responsibility is ours - on finance.

<u>DISTRICT REVIEW GROUP</u> - there will be a full report at the November District Meeting.

CHILDREN'S WORK - A new Secretary is needed. Kaleidoscope Day on 17th September has been cancelled. There will be a Children's and Youth Workers training on Friday evening and Saturday 14/15th October.

ECUMENICAL - Churches Together in Sussex are meeting at Brighthelm on September 24th. There is a Christmas Publicity Pack available for use by all Churches.

YOUTH COMMITTEE - District Youth Event at Goring on October 22/23rd - on Saturday afternoon 8-11yrs and 11+yrs on Saturday evening staying overnight and attending the Sunday Youth Service.

Fury Council needs a representative from this District to be in a support group. Fury Assembly at the Hayes, Swanwick - two representatives needed from this District.

THE PROVINCIAL DAY will be at Croydon on September 14th 1996.

SOMPTING has recently started a Chinese Christian School teaching the Chinese language and culture. Prayers are asked for the 35 children who come from a wide area.

THE SECRETARY encourages all Churches to discuss the Patterns of Ministry and the District Review Group Reports. If there are any specific needs for prayer or information within the Worthing Churches they are asked to let the Secretary know for the November meeting.

<u>LOMAS HOUSE</u> - The Assistant Warden is leaving shortly - it being a residential post - applications are invited.

# A REFUGEE WRITES ........

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

I have a great desire to write to you. It's true, we have never met, but I'm aware that our Lord unites His family in His love. Because of this I feel free to write this letter to you.

My name is Zeljko. I am from that part of former Yugoslavia where war is raging, in Bosnia-Herzogovina. I left my home more than a year ago and came to Novi Sad, in Serbia.

In a new city with new people who live differently from the way to which I was accustomed, I lived in a small room where three of us stayed. There were only 2 beds and no bathroom.

One day two people appeared at the door. I discovered they were Christians from a church called 'Christian Fellowship'. Little did i know that they would soon become my pastor and sister in Christ. Very politely they introduced themselves and said they heard there was a refugee here needing help. They had a food parcel for me. That was a big surprise. 'How is it possible that during this war when many are stealing and struggling to stay alive there are people giving out humanitarian aid?' I asked myself. They told me the parcel was from Christians in Britain. I received it with thanks.

They invited me to their church, where I met other refugees like me. As I observed these smiling Christians and saw how they lived I knew there was something wrong with me that needed to be changed.

After a short while I gave my life to Christ. I met the God of the Universe and felt His love for me. Now I have strength to live every day. I realised the truth that the Lord has given me life by giving His life for me. I placed myself in His hands and now He directs my life. I'm so thankful to Him.

I found I wasn't alone. The church distributes humanitarian aid from Britain to hundreds of refugees. Knowing their needs I got involved in this ministry. Today I am one of many who bring parcels and hope to these people.

We would need much paper to list the hundreds of refugees who send greetings to you. Because of this, in the name of children, older people, the handicapped and sick, in the name of the 'Christian Fellowship', and in my own name, I want to express these words of thanks.

May the Lord truly bless your every effort, sacrifice and unselfishness in helping these unfortunate people.

A Church Missionary Society worker has commended the Church in Zaire for its work with the refugees who have flooded into the area from Rwanda. CMS mission partner Patricia Nickson, who was in Britain for three days before travelling back to the refugee zone, said that the Church and people of Zaire had been quick and unselfish in offering practical help and opening their homes to refugees, particularly as, initially, they were dealing with the situation without the help of the aid agencies, which arrived some two to three weeks later..

# PEN AND BOOK CLUB. 1 BIRENE ROAD. WORTHING.

Dear Mr. Heckels, I am writing to ask whether you can assist me in finding some more much needed helpers for our service. A Pen and Book Club sends books to people who are housebound, and who cannot easily use an ordinary library. The crux of our work, however, is the penfriendship which accompanies the Library service. Experience has shown that the exchange of letters between our helpers and their members provides a valuable psychological outlet for people whose normal contacts with the outside world are limited by age or illness. I would also point out that, unlike a personal visit, a letter can be taken out and read over and over again in times of boredom or lonelines. We do not visit our members personally as, over the years, experience has shown that to do so impairs the special value of a pen friendship. Many of our helpers exchange letters with their members over a pertial of many years and, naturally, each builds up an image of the other. Should the two parties meet this image might be rudely shattered!

We have a different met of helpers, with cars, who deliver our books and letters, collecting the previous books when the current ones are delivered. The returned books are brought back to our offices here, and yet other helpers put them away.

At present, insemuch as three of the four branches of our service are situated in offices at the above address, we are finding it difficult to locate sufficient helpers. We need people who will come in to our offices here to choose books for, and write friendly letters to, the five or six members allotted to each of them. We try to make our service exceptionally personal and, therefore, it is particularly advantageous to people who have few outside contacts. I mention this because, apart from our need of helpers, we should be glad to receive from you the names and addresses of any housebound people who you feel might benefit from our service.

We also need helpers with cars to undertake delivery work. This is zoned to cover different areas of Worthing and Lancing. We pay £5.00 per round for the petrol. We particularly need someone on Thursdays and on Friday afternoons.

Hoping very much that you may be able to help us in this matter as it is difficult to maintain the high standard of service that we like to do without adequate voluntary staff, and with every good wish.



Dear Friends,

Some time ago we were involved in helping a Vietnamese boat family who came to live near to us and needed some care as they settled into a completely different lifestyle. Even if you have never been involved in such situations, you can well imagine the first and main problem is one of language. Having no concept of Vietnamese or Cantonese, and with our refugee family having very little English, we found ourselves very limited in the words and phrases we used to communicate. Fortunately, sometimes there was a person available who could communicate in Cantonese, and would come in real emergencies, but most of the visits were done without this luxury. Of course, this had its lighter moments as we tried to explain to Mi Ling – the mother of the household – that concentrated orange juice needed water added, although our boys were trying hard to drink it and smile! But it also had some serious problems when it came to filling in forms and even, at first, just simply shopping.

Our task was to be 'befrienders' and to help the family settle into a new home and try to help with the problems that such a traumatic upheaval had caused in their lives. One morning Ba Loung – the father – said to me, "Peter, what your work?" Now Ba Loung was a sort of nominal Buddhist and so there were some problems to explain my work to him in simple language he could understand. Minister he would never understand, so I thought maybe priest. However, this drew a blank expression, (I guess I don't look like a Buddhist monk), as did church. Perseverence with church, however, began to get a response for he had seen the building, but it was not until I got him along to the building that I could begin to really have the feeling that he was beginning to comprehend a little. Yet I was left feeling the inadequacy of language to express what I did, as somehow what went on in the building was not fully recognised.

Through the care of many Christians, Ba Loung and Mi Ling became settled, as did their children, and they had another son around the time Philip was born, who bore the very English name, Eric. By the time Philip and Eric were at school, our regular involvement with the family had almost ceased, but Eric, along with other friends, was a regular visitor to our home. It was also a time when school assemblies were very much to the forefront of our ministry, and school work was very important. So as well as assemblies, there were some visits to classes at various stages. Visiting one class of six year olds, a little girl asked "Is your name Jesus?" "No," I replied, "I just tell people about Jesus – my name is Peter." Recounting this incident later it dawned on me that this answered Ba Loung's question. Yet it was not a complete answer.

The simple answer is that part of the minister's role is to tell people about Jesus. We also believe that it is to show people the love of Jesus in what we do. Ba Loung took years to have enough language to be able to talk about Jesus, but through action, he and Mi Ling could see something of Jesus's care for them and their family. Yet it does not end there, for it was not just us who showed them love, but many others, and part of our role was to support them too. So perhaps this is what ministry is about; telling people about Jesus; showing His love, and encouraging others to do the same. This, of course, is what church is too – people, not buildings – which is why I hope we will continue to seek God's help in finding people to serve on all our committees, that we may be organised to grow and encourage one another as we work side by side; a people seeking to do the work of Jesus no matter how many problems we seem to be faced with.

Please continue to pray for us and our family as we share this work together.

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# SYNOD MEETING - 8 October 1994.

The Autumn Synod of the Southern Province was held at Sanderstead URC, Croydon, formerly Sanderstead Congregational Church before Union. Opening Worship was conducted by the Revd P Jones, Minister of Sanderstead URC. Bible Study was led by Revd P Southcombe, Southern Province Evangelism Enabler and Minister of The Vines URC Rochester, who directed our thoughts to the first part of Mark's Gospel and the calling of the first disciples as the best example of discipleship. There is no going back for Christians, this is the time for us all to be involved in the Decade of Evangelism before it is over, He stated that Conversion alone does not make disciples, we must follow this by caring development to make disciples.

In the report from the Provincial Council we were told:

- 1. The General Assembly had re-appointed the Revd David Helyar as Moderator of the Southern Province until 31 August 1999.
- 2. The next 'Provincial Day' will be held on 14 September 1996.
- 3. IMS/CWM Bi-Centenary celebrations will take place 12-14 July 1995 at the City Temple and at Westminster Central Hall. The General Assembly encourages every local church to celebrate this particular anniversary. The theme will be 'Dare to Dream' and 16 July will be designated World Mission Sunday.
- 4. General Assembly, 1995, Eastbourne. Arrangements are gathering momentum and progress so far has been good.
- 5. Patterns of Ministry. All churches are asked to study and discuss the booklet and leaflets dealing with this matter. An amendment to the text was notified: on page 28, 9.34 should read as 'Authorised and not as 'Ordained'.

A feature of recent Synods has been 'Stories from....' and the Autumn Synod was no exception; we had stories from two districts.

A Story from Croydon.

The divorce ratenationwide is that one in three marriages end in divorce, in Surrey it is higher than this. Children of divorced parents are often distressed by the fact that they cannot readily meet the parent with whom they are not living and to overcome this difficulty, Croydon District has established a contact Centre. The aim of the Centre is to provide neutral ground where meetings can take place in warm and attractive surroundings. There are now 100 such centres nationwide. The Croydon Centre was established on 3 September this year and is open on saturdays from 2-4 pm, providing a child-centred environment and not giving a counselling or advisory service. Referrals to the Centre are made by local Council and Welfare Officers. In cases of divorce, one pair of grandparents may not be able to meet their grandchildren; the Croydon Centre makes this possible. A story from Crawley.

To help the unemployed and people on low incomes, a Credit Union has been set up in specific areas. Several churches have combined to help small savers. In addition, local 'Barter Schemes' with specific exchange rates have been formed.

Among the remits from General Assembly was one relating to Student Grants, a matter which was discussed at length in General Assembly, and in the resolution passed the following was included. 'Assembly encourages members of local churches, district councils and provincial synods to write to Members of Parliament expressing their concern and, in areas of student population, to provide practical support to students in their locality.

The afternoon session was primarily devoted to an address by the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Revd R J McKelvey, but prior to this new ministers, retired ministers, students and officers from Districts were received. It was good to see our friend Revd Edward Symmons in the 'line-up' and to meet him later

The title of the Moderator's address was 'Today's Culture and the Gospel' in which he stated that the present day culture is regarded as being hostile to the Christian religion. The world the older generation inherited is very different from the world today. Then, missions shared the optimism of the 17th and 18th centuries: now we do not find mission easy. What have advances in modern technology done to help those living in Third World countries, compared with our own?

There was, however, ground for hope. People are showing an increasing interest in spirituality and it is widely recognised that much is lost in materialism. We must guard against extreme spirituality groups such as the Solar Temple. There is a growing unease in the growth of materialism: individual's spirits need to be nourished and they should be encouraged not to think so much of thir own interests but to care more for the community in which they live. Conventional Christianity has become to cerebal – hence the growth of Charismatic churches. Christians have an important contribution to make to society and should not be depressed by its seeming indifference and should seize opportunities as they arise. We should get into schools to help the teachers and the children. Above all, let us seek individually and collectively to ensure the Good News gets through.

Closing Worship was led by the Moderator, David Helyar, in which we shared in the Service of Holy Communion, for me the first occasion at a Synod and a moving one, involving approximately 300 representatives. All in all, I felt that this was one of the best Synods I have attended in that we devoted more time to Worship and spiritual matters instead of 'business'.

# UNDERSTANDING THE BIBLE.



# DURRINGTON COMMUNITY CENTRE - HOW IT BEGAN.

In 1979 the need for a community centre for West Durrington became very apparent. Two initiatives took place. First the West Residents' Association called together forming a organisations with the object of Community Centre Working Party. Second was the vision Goring United Reformed Church had of creating some form of outreach in West Durrington. With these objects in view, and with the support of the Synod, I was invited to join the Rev. William Connelly as Associate Minister, with a special charge to look at this possibility. The Durrington Community Centre Association (DUCCA) was formed at a public meeting, chaired by Councillor John Cotton, in March 1980. constitution for DUCCA was approved, and Councillor appointed Chairman, with me as Secretary. It was discovered that a site had been marked for community use. A Community Centre building was designed by Architects Morgan, Carn and Partners, planning permission obtained, and fund raising commenced. After 2% years a request was made to Worthing Borough Council for financial assistance. After meeting with the Officers of DUCCA the Borough Council decided to support the scheme and accept responsibility for the construction of the Centre, the first of 3 Centres for the Borough. They granted a licence to DUCCA to be responsible for the development of a Community Centre, and DUCCA raised £10,000 towards the cost, plus providing extra items such as furniture and equipment. Building commenced in February 1984 and was completed in November 1984. It had been agreed by the Working Party that if, and when, such a Centre was built a Service of Worship of an ecumenical nature would be held in it on Sundays at 10.30am. September 1984 the Methodist Church appointed Rev. Valerie Chapman to help in the Durrington outreach. Valerie and I conducted the Service on Advent Sunday December 2nd 1984 with a congregation of 90 people. God had blessed the vision and the endeavour. It must be pointed out that it is not a Church building, but an OPEN DOOR for the Church to enter, and not only on Sunday mornings. The door is also open to the many activities held in the Centre during the week. To quote from the objects of the Centre: - "TO PROVIDE FACILITIES IN THE INTERESTS OF SOCIAL VELFARE, FOR RECREATION AND LEISURE TIME OCCUPATION, WITH THE OBJECT OF IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF LIFE." DUCCA commenced full operation in January 1985. On Friday April 26th 1985 the Official Opening took place in the presence of H.R.H. Princess Alexandra.

A Service to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of DUCCA was held at the Centre on Sunday morning October 9th. A Thanksgiving Service is to be held on November 27th at 10.30 am to mark the 10 years of continued Worship there. The preacher will be Rev. Valerie Chapman.

Dear Friends,

The time of year is on us once again when we begin to celebrate the birth of Jesus, the Son of God. No doubt by the time you read these words your preparations will be well under way. For the church, Advent is a season of preparation, a time to get ready for the birth of Jesus. You should by now have received our Advent booklet with its lessons, prayers and thoughts to lead us to Christmas in the right If you have not, then please collect one from church, although there are only a limited number available. Advent means 'coming' and we really do need to be ready for the coming of Jesus, making sure that our spiritual preparations are not left to the last minute, or even crowded out by all the other areas we get involved with at this time of year. For Christmas to have its fullest meaning there is a need to spend time reflecting on the event and its time spent preparing ourselves to go to the stable at importance; Bethlehem and bring ourselves into the presence of the Son of God.

As a church we must be ready to make people feel welcome whenever they come to join us, especially at worship. Unfortunately too often we just let people drift along; they come and worship with us, but never feel they can 'come' and truly belong. Is this because we think they only come at Christmas? The shepherds and wise men left the stable in Bethlehem full of joy, singing God's praise and rejoicing in what they had found. Perhaps that group of people celebrating Jesus's birth truly formed the first church fellowship, sharing together and with God the joy they felt.

Of course, for many, Christmas will be one of the few occasions when they give any thought to church; indeed, for many it will be an annual pilgrimage to sing nice carols. It is always our hope, therefore, to see new faces in church over this time, and if their visit is to mean anything to them it becomes up to each of us to play our part. People must feel more than welcome; they must feel that they belong, and have their part to play. This means the church, its services and its people, becoming a real part of the lives of all who come. To everyone there must be a genuine sense of God's love at this a sense that Jesus has come for them. So my appeal is to those who share week by week in our worship to make all who come along aware of the joy and love we have for God, and perhaps do more than welcome the new faces that they may leave sensing, like the shepherds and wise men, that Jesus belongs to them and they to Him. This may, of course, mean talking to people about what we have shared in our worship before letting them disappear into the cold December air. If you wonder why I make such an appeal, and you may feel I should address myself to those who are not among us very often, may I ask you to read the parable of the prodigal son (Luke 15: 11-32) and remember it is only through our concern that we can make the return to the Father easier for our brothers and sisters.

All the family at the Manse wish you a God-filled Christmas and pray that God's peace and blessing will come to each one of you.

# PASTORAL CONCERNS OF THE CHURCHES

<u>Shelley Road Worthing</u> - Hope to hold a dedication of the alterations to their premises on Saturday 21 January 1995.

Hove Central - The District concurred with the call of Rev Brian Stone to Haywards Heath  $(\frac{2}{3})$  and Lindfield  $(\frac{1}{3})$  and thanked him for all his service in the District. His induction will be Saturday 4 February 1995.

Brighton Area Team Ministry - The Brighton Churches held a joint service and discussion with the Moderator and are exploring the practical considerations.

<u>Lay Presidency of the Sacraments</u> - Those currently authorised will be extended to July 1995.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

The District Target was not met by £1,156 and the Province also had a shortfall. All Churches are urged to look again at their 1995 offers and increase their giving.

### PATTERNS OF MINISTRY REPORT

John Ellis of Medway District, a member of the working party, introduced this interim report. It is written for the whole of the URC, to address the needs of each Church to have a recognised local leader — whether Ministerial or Lay — to administer the Word and the Sacraments, to give vision, leadership and pastoral care, and to address the problem of the shortage of Stipendiary Ministers for the Churches. We have some 1,800 Churches but less than 800 paid Ministers — 1 Minister per 2.3 Churches. The average URC has less than 55 members. We need to look at the possibility of using more unpaid Ministers, Elders and Lay Preachers who would therefore require further training.

It is about equipping the local Church to reach out into the world, but this report is inconclusive because we need to allow the Holy Spirit room to move and we need to hear what the Spirit is saying - thus feedback is vital.

This report is commended to the Churches in the District and to individuals to respond and comment upon before 14 December 1994 to Rev David Cornick at Westminster College, Cambridge.

### DISTRICT REVIEW GROUP

Rev Brian Stone and Brian Brazier presented this report. No scoping will take place until this report is accepted and agreed, therefore Churches without Ministers will be further delayed, which made several Churches unhappy.

The scoping recommendations are for 14 full time stipendiary Ministers in the Sussex West District - part-time and non-stipendiary Ministers are not included. It recommends that the scoping pattern be re-examined every 5 years.

All 23 Churches have been placed into 8 groups. Goring is grouped with Durrington LEP, St Columbas, Shelley Road and Sompting and they have been scoped for 4 Ministers. Durrington LEP is scoped half time and presently has a URC Minister, though it will not always be so.

With the formation of a group, when a Minister is called:-

1) The future invitation of a Minister to serve the Group must be made on the basis of all the Churches in the Group being parties, through their separate Church meetings and the Group Elders' meeting, together with the existing Ministers, to the issue of the invitation.

2) The present Ministers in Churches forming the Group be accepted in good

faith by the other Churches within the Group.

3) Prior to the issue of an invitation from the Group, the present Ministers and Elders agree the form that ministry shall have within the Group, taking notice of the Group scoping agreed by District.

It will be necessary to make the invited Minister aware of the form of

ministry to which they are being called within the Group.

This report is remitted to the Churches in the District for discussion at Elders and Church meetings. Comments are to be sent to the District Secretary at the latest by 10 days before the District Council meeting at Goring on 2 February 1995, at which further discussion will take place. Then, if this report is accepted and agreed, it will form the basis for the scoping policy of Churches in this District.

<u>DISTRICT ELDERS DAY</u> will be held at Hounsom Memorial URC, Hove on Saturday 28 January 1995. Speaker: Rev Peter Southcombe - Evangelism Enabler - on "Fear and Hope."

# WHO IS INDOCTRINATING YOUR CHILDREN?

We were once asked "By teaching your children at home, outside the State system, and using a Christian syllabus, aren't you indoctrinating them?"

Having carefully considered it, the answer was YES. It's not possible to train children in a vacuum, it's done from a basis, a set of values. The only choice is FROM WHAT BASIS?

Here are two possibilities:-

BASIS 1: The world happened and developed by chance (evolution). People are the highest form of life (secular humanism). There is no absolute right and wrong (relativism). Do what you like if it doesn't hurt others, or feels good (selfishness). Challenge all forms of authority (rebellion).

BASIS 2: God made the world (creation). We are imperiect people in an imperfect world (sinners). God puts us right with Him as we seek forgiveness (salvation). God love us (unconditional love), and has given us good instruction (the Bible) for living, respect for others, and right and wrong (absolute values).

The real question, then, is much broader and more urgent. "In what are your children being inductrinated?"

'Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful.' Psalm 1 v 1.

When first led to embark on Christian home-education in 1992 we were, and remain, very aware of our own short-comings. We have, however, seen the fruit of full-time Christian education in the lives of many young people from pre-school to late teens.

We have resources (tapes, videos, books, magazines) to lend, and experiences to share, if they can be of help to anyone.

# TEXT OF A LETTER DATED 18/10/94 FROM RUTH CHATFIELD AT GEMENA , ZAIRE

Dear Friends at GURC,

Greetings from Zaire in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

As it begins to get colder in England, so it will get hotter here, as the dry season begins. Andrea and I are generally keeping well and are mostly enjoying the challenges of living and working here! Although I'm kept busy doing administration and Wycliffe finances, I also go a couple of times a week to the airport to fetch missioaries, mail and other supplies flown in on the two missionaries planes from Central African Republic and other parts of Zaire. We are very grateful for these planes, since the dirt roads are very bad at the moment - full of mudholes to get stuck in!

Last week I was visited by someone from the local tax office, checking that we were paying the right amount of taxes for our Zairean employees. However, it's hard to know what 'the right amount' is since there is little national control on these things, and many officials seem to be doing 'what is right in their own eyes'! Recently we had to pay tax on our cat!

We enjoy being part of a church here. We are in a singing group, and we have just started doing Bible Studies in a Zairean home. It is a challenge to try to share the Gospel in a cross-cultural context.

Two American ladies have just moved from Gemena to a village where they will learn the language and eventually start translating the New Testament. To get to the village they first travel by 4-wheel drive truck, then by boat up the river, then by bicycle! They hope that the airstrip will soon be ready for them to fly in!

Thanks for your participation in God's work in this country where people have few of the privileges and comforts which we enjoy!
